Finding the hang-out

wenty years ago is not as long as it seems. It was just twenty years ago, in 1995, that Amazon and eBay each launched to the public, and online shopping became a reality. Fast-forward twenty years and online shopping has become ubiquitous with nearly every brand you can imagine boasting its own web presence. Today more and more commerce is accomplished without visiting a store or talking to a sales person, people simply decide they want something, research it online, and then buy it. A recent Forrester Research survey found that 90% of the buying journey actually takes place before a consumer or business person actually makes contact with an actual vendor.

So what does this mean to you? Well, most importantly it means that you have more choices, but it also means that those people you're trying to reach have more choices. Whether they are students, customers, buyers, or consumers, they all have more choices. This makes it even more imperative for you to communicate with them effectively across multiple channels. Some want to hear from you on social media, others by a text message, or perhaps email, and some don't want to hear from you at all, but if you contact them via direct mail, or web advertising they may engage after all.

L.L. Bean, and Lands' End offer an interesting case study in reaching their customers. Both apparel companies conduct more than 95% of their customer transactions online, yet they

both rely on a proportionally heavy direct mail effort to communicate deals and offers to their customers ultimately driving them to their websites. Perhaps an even more interesting example of this phenomena was when Zappos.com, the 100% web retailer. and purveyor of nice shoes first began using a printed catalogue mailed directly to its customers in 2009. Since embarking on this strategy, several other "pure-play" web-only, retailers have adopted a similar strategy including Amazon, eBay, Shutterfly, Art.com, JustFab, Snapfish, One King's Lane, Modcloth and Minted. Obviously the strategy works.


Again, what does all this mean to you? This information is just another reminder of how important it is that you have a deep understanding of those with whom you're trying to communicate. Are they primarily on social media (a Facebook ad campaign)? Do they spend most of their day online (perhaps SEO & SEM)? Are they of a generation that has less trust in the online world (maybe a direct mail campaign)? Whether you're trying to reach a potential student, a donor, a parent, a buyer, or a business owner, it really doesn't matter. What does matter is that you understand how they like to communicate, **you know where** they "hang out," and then you figure out a way to meet them there.


4 things you should do in Photoshop

Perform edits on separate layers. To give you maximum ability to change your edits later, make each of your adjustments on separate layers. This way you can also easily lower the opacity of individual edits to make changes more realistic.




Use Smart Filters. By using Smart Filters you protect your original image. You can also reopen the filter for more editing, hide filter effects from part of your image and change the blend/opacity.

- 1. Filter>Convert for Smart Filters
- 2. Make a mask selection (optional)
- 3. Choose filter in the Filter menu



Feather the mask, not the selection. By feathering the selection you are able to adjust the amount of feather.

- 1. Create the selection
- 2. Add a layer mask
- 3. Double-click the layer mask in the **Layers** panel
- 4. Drag the **Feather** slider to adjust



Grayscale conversion. Instead of choosing Mode>Grayscale, use this method to get more definition in the midtones:

Traditional way (Mode>Grayscale)



- 1. Mode>LAB
- 2. In the **Channels** panel, selection the **Lightness** channel
- 3. Mode>Grayscale

Better way (using LAB & Lightness)



Colors equal more direct mail opens

Studies have shown that using color on the outside of your direct mail envelope equals higher open rates. In fact, one study found that 69% of people are more likely to open a mail piece with color text and graphics on the front than they are when the envelope is plain.

Adding color can make a huge difference in your bottom line. Even if your conversion rate remains the same, by doubling the number of people who open your direct mail letter or package, you double the sales from that campaign.

How can you add color to your envelopes?

- Graphics and images
- Color banners
- Company logos
- Patterned backgrounds
- Brightly colored indicia
- Outlines of the state in which they live

These are simple changes that can yield big results. Why not try color on your next envelope and see what a difference it makes for you?

Advanced folder and taping options arrive

McClung has installed a Heidelberg Stahl TH82 automated pallet-fed folder and a BR Moll VersaFold table with fold and taping capabilities. The Stahl folder is a major addition to bindery's equipment and combines level two automation with a presser/stacker delivery. The VersaFold table applies tape to direct mail return postcards as well as adding folding options.

"The new folder gives us a significant increase in production speed and considerable savings on make-ready," noted JoAnne Estes, Bindery Coordinator. "The folder automatically sets the roller and plate settings, and with



the pallet-based feeder, it becomes a one-person operation. The forms compress, batch count and stack while the operator unloads the continuous delivery, saving time and eliminating repetitive motion."

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
